Grace Cottage, in rural Windham County, Vermont (pop. 46,000), is a Critical Access Hospital serving 31,000 patients annually. Despite the staff's expert medical care, the mid-century building has a maze of dead-end hallways and has only three entrances/exits, creating operational and safety concerns.

In early 2022, Grace Cottage In early 2022, USDA Rural **Development's Community** Facilities program awarded a Training and Technical Assistance grant (TAT) to help cover the cost of architectural drawings for a crucial expansion of the emergency department. The Brattleboro Development Credit Corporation (BDCC) also provided technical assistance, helping determine costs and compose the plan, which the Hospital staff and board used as their reference and resource for fund-raising.

Just over a year later, CEO Douglas DiVello cut the ribbon on a spectacular new emergency department, featuring a triage room, an ambulance portico for weather protection, a waiting room and check-in space to preserve patient confidentiality, and a front room to accommodate a nighttime security guard.

Meanwhile, the persistent and well-organized staff and board at Grace Cottage continue to move the planning and design work forward to make the long-held dream of a new clinic into reality.
